What is a councillor?

Councillors are elected to represent an individual geographical unit on the council, known as a ward or - mainly in smaller parishes - the entire parish or town council area. They are generally elected by the public every four years.

What do councillors do?

Councillors have three main components to their work.

- 1. Decision making Through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.
- 2. Monitoring Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
- 3. Getting involved locally As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include:
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Going to meetings of local organisations such as tenants' associations.
- · Going to meetings of bodies affecting the wider community.
- · Taking up issues on behalf of members of the public.
- · Running a surgery for residents to bring up issues.
- · Meeting with individual residents in their own homes.

Visiting your council is the best way to find out what happens there. Give the council a call and find out when its next public meeting happens. By law, ordinary people are allowed to be present at most council business.

Still Looking back to the 1970's

October 2nd 1972

The meetings were held in Cullum House, the then home of Miss Elsa Kilpatrick.

All members were present. Mr Tildsley reported that the fete had raised a profit of £150 17. Margues were borrowed from the local Scouts.

Miss Kilpatrick reported that the Rev Wake had agreed to hold a Carol Service on the 17th of December.

We were in interregnum at that time following the retirement of Rev Jones who had been rector here for over forty years. The Diocese was regrouping and we were Elsa Kilpatrick at 60 joined with Nowton, Stanningfield, and Bradfield



Combust. A new rectory was built and the Rev Cedric Catton eventually came to live there in 1974

A general meeting was to take place to finalise the position of the Hall.

Arrangements to hold a Dance in Whepstead for the 20th of October were going ahead.

A discussion took place on the possibility of holding another Christmas draw.

Nov 6th

The Dance raised £69. The organisers were thanked. Miss Woodman Smith said

that Mr Alfie Bass had been asked to produce two estimates for the hall. One for a wooden structure and one for brick as it was thought that the costs would be similar.

The proposed Draw was cancelled as a printer could not be found. It was proposed that an outing to the Cinderella Pantomime should be organised. It was decided to book fifty seats for January.

Mr Inches reported that £1,200 was available in Barclays Bank.

Mr Bass attended the meeting. He produced an outline plan and explained that at current costs the cost of wood and brick was approx the same. The cost would be in the region £4 per sq ft, totalling £8,000. In this price was an allowance for showers and fitted cupboards. Miss Kilpatrick

proposed that they proceed in principle with outline planning permission and the compulsory purchase order of the land in that order. This was agreed.

Miss Kilpatrick reported that she had purchased a duplicating machine for £2.

January 8th

The carol service raised £13 69 for general maintenance of the church.

The mower for the cricket green was to be sent for repair.

Arrangements were finalised for the outing to the Pantomime on January 19^{th} . Sixty six people wanted to go. The cost was to be 50p for adults, 30p for children over 12 and children under 12 were to be free. Mrs Lebbon was to arrange a bus.

February 5th

Nothing done as yet about the mower which had been sent to Barclay Motors. Mrs Wright agreed to look in to the delay.

The Pantomime was a success and it was agreed to do this every year!! Alwyne's coaches were to used again when ever needed.

It was proposed by Mrs Lebbon that Cotswold colour bricks be used to build the hall. This was carried.

THE METCALFE ARMS

Mrs Glendinning was leaving the pub on February the 14th. A letter was to be sent to thank her for all the facilities made available to the Community since it was founded. Mrs Wright said that crockery etc was for sale cheaply from the pub.

Mrs Baker and Mrs Wright agreement to purchase any items that would be of use in the future for up to £15.

A Pancake Race was to be organised followed by a comic football match. Mrs Pettitt undertook the arrangements for this. It was hoped to cover costs with refreshments and a draw. A children's sponsored walk was also planned.

Mr. Shirreff reminded the committee that the mower was due.

March 5th

The estimate for the mower repairs of £32 was accepted.

Miss Kilpatrick reported that the duplicator needing overhauling at a cost of £11.87. It was agreed that the work be put in hand.

Mrs Wright reported that she had purchased 50 cups on behalf of the committee from the sale at the Metcalfe Arms at a cost of £8 50. (These were in use until 2006!)

The Pancake Day festivities were very enjoyable and raised £7.37. More funds were to come from the sponsored walk.

FUTURE ACTIVIES

It was thought possible to hold a concert in the church again. The Beyton Singers were to be invited. The Summer fete was to be held in June or September. Plans were also afoot to hold a Ladies Darts Tournament in the Metcalfe. A children's sports day was also proposed.

It is quite staggering the work that was put in at the beginning of the Community council, to raise money to build a hall. They started many traditions that have continued to this day. Elsa Kilpatrick was a committee member into her nineties. All the other names mentioned who are still in Hawstead are always ready to help with anything. It must be a bug you get!

Just how did they end up with a sectional building that served for over thirty years and gave the Community quite a large sum to start a fund to replace it? Find out in the next issue.
