The hall continues to attract bookings for receptions and parties and the occasional conference, which come mainly from the surrounding villages and Bury St. Edmunds. The summer was busy with two week end functions each month. We now operate a walk away service which most of the time works well.

Within the village we have the carpet bowls and yoga still running weekly. Memorable events from last year included the plant sale with the calorie free breakfast. Jo was unable to do the plant sale this this year due to the lack of greenhouse space.

The Theatre Royal put on their touring play, 'The Two of us'. We had a full house. Our village fete was one of the best fete days we have had, with the Green Dragons dancing and Nick Lowe singing for us. There was an amazing array of tractors to admire. Our fruit and flower show continues to survive.

Village quiz nights have been a success with fish and chip suppers.

We have hosted two village parties one last October and one just recently to celebrate the Royal Wedding.

A coffee morning was arranged as part of the biggest coffee morning in support of the Macmillan Trust. We will be doing this again later in the year.

We have catered for Christmas, the Lavenham Deanery, the local singles group, harvest suppers and village parties quite successfully.

The Annual Parish Council was held here this year.

There is a group planning a pantomime for January next year.

Hall maintenance, Health and safety

A PIR light has been fitted over the emergency door in the main hall. This gives good light onto the ramp which butts on to the patio, white lines have been on to the ramp edges. Finger guards have been fitted to all internal doors. The exterior wood has had a protective treatment which will last for five years at least. All external doors and window have been re varnished. The Parish Council funded this. We have installed a water softener for the good of our Hobart dish steriliser.

A new welcome pack has been produced, which will be updated as necessary and given to new arrivals in Hawstead.

THE INSTALLATION OF THE HATCHMENTS AND THE PRESENTATION OF THE NADFAS RECORD BOOK

On Friday the 6^{th} May a ceremony and lecture took place in our church to celebrate the installation of the newly restored hatchments and the handing over of the NADFAS (National Association of Decorative and Fine Arts Society) record book of all monuments, artefacts and fittings contained within the church.

As reported previously the hatchments project has taken about seven years to raise the funds and have the conservation work completed.

After finally obtaining permission from the Diocese to erect the units on the Chancel wall a scaffolding was erected, with great care to ensure no damage was inflicted on the existing monuments.

Dave Dawson supervised Simon Miller and myself in the installation of the units which, though not too heavy, were rather cumbersome to manoeuvre on to the fixings we had installed.

At the dedication a short prayer was given by Rev. Jayne Buckles which was then followed by the presentation of a bound copy of the NADFAS record book to the Parish.

This record has been three years in production requiring much painstaking and detailed work. Other copies will be sent to the Bury Record Office, the V. & A museum, the Council for the Care of Churches and the National Monuments Record Centre in Swindon.

The village copy will be available for inspection by arrangement.

We were then given a highly interesting, and amusing, lecture by Clive Paine relating the hatchments to the various relevant monuments around the church. Those of you who have never been to a C.P. lecture on history have missed a treat, as he has the ability to bring the subject alive in his own special way.

Please take a few minutes and go to the church to see the new installation. I think you might find it interesting.


