Village Hall Review

As 2003 draws to a close I thought it was a good time to review the work accomplished by the Project Committee during the past year.

After heated discussions last December a poll of the village in the New Year gave a clear mandate to go ahead and rebuild. The insurance company also made a handsome settlement giving us a good start to our fund raising.

While the village was being asked about the activities it would enjoy and support in the new hall, the project team were visiting recently completed halls as far a field as Essex and Cambridgeshire. The information we gathered stood us in good stead for preparation of our brief for our architect, Chris Sale, the sixth we interviewed. Chris is no newcomer to designing village halls and his work is well liked by the Lottery Commission (hopefully our principal funder).

In September you came to the exhibition in the church and approved the design. We have now submitted a planning application and a new lease is being negotiated with the Parish Council. Permission from DEFRA to re-build on the village Green is also being sought.

In addition to the architect, a quantity surveyor and a structural engineer have been appointed (professionals essential to the construction of a public building and required by funders). The completed application to the Lottery Community Fund (almost ready to submit as I write) with its supporting documentation is over a hundred pages long! We have had discussions with St. Edmundsbury District Council and believe that they will make a very substantial grant. We have also submitted an application for £50 000 to the Landfill company WREN for the final tranche of money needed to meet building costs. One condition attached to the payment of the WREN grant is that we must find 11% of the total requested and it must come from money not already nominated for the project. So we as a community must find £5,500 to qualify. A good start has been made with Betty Milburn, our Suffolk County Councillor, promising a donation from her locality budget. Most encouragingly too is that people in the village with whom I have shared the need have given very generously. If you would like to contribute please contact Sonja Monk Tel. 386876 or any member of the Community Council Committee. Remember every pound you give raises £100 from WREN!

The record takings at the Plant Sale, Produce Show and Fete show just how supportive the whole village is towards raising funds and next month we hope to publish a timetable of fundraising events in 2004. There will be fun things for everyone to do, young and old. In the meantime the Project Group will be working on its application to the European Rural Development Programme for funds for kitchen equipment, tables and chairs. If all goes according to plan by this time next year the new hall will be nearing completion.

A Taste of Scotland

WHISKY SYLLABUB

Syllabubs are a little taste of Scotland and, what's more they are the easiest and quickest of puddings to make. This recipe will take you only five minutes from start to finish, providing you have soaked the lemon rind in the whisky beforehand.

4fl oz whisky 1 lemon

1pint of double cream chilled 8 tbl clear heather honey or other 4sprigs fresh rosemary, for decoration (this is optional: if you prefer, reserve some lemon zest and use that instead.)

The day before, peel and juice the lemon, put the rind and juice in a bowl with the whisky. Cover and

Leave to soak overnight in a cool place.

It only takes 30 seconds to one minute to make the syllabub, so I always do it just before it is needed.

Strain the lemon and whisky mixture into a large chilled bowl, reserving the lemon if you wish to use it. Add the double cream and, using a wire whisk, whisk the mixture until it thickens and holds a soft peak – this will take 30 seconds to one minute. Be very careful at this stage, as you can over whip.

I have to say it is easy and simple to do and people love it!!!

Spoon this alcoholic cream into individual glasses (tall if you have them) alternating with small spoons of the clear honey for sweetness. Serve with some shortbread. This recipe will serve four. It works well if you double it.

QUICK DRAMBULE FUDGE

8oz (225g) plain chocolate

1oz unsalted butter

8tbsp Drambuie

4tbsp condensed milk

1lb of icing sugar sifted

Grease an 8inch square tin. Melt the chocolate and butter together and beat in the Drambuie and condensed milk to a smooth mixture. Add the icing sugar and mix well until smooth. Turn into the tin and press down with a palette knife. Chill until firm then cut into triangles and serve heaped on a plate.

Film Review

Fluff Actually

It's not often that we go to the cinema preferring to wait for the films we want to see to appear on video. But the pre-launch hype for Love Actually got to us (Jacquie more than me) and when it came out we just had to go and see it on the big screen. For all of the acting and comic talent on screen and the skills of screenwriter Richard Curtis, Love Actually is nowhere near the holiday prize package it's intended to be. Curtis, directing for the first time, interweaves too many characters and storylines and shortchanges them all. Droll, delightful moments do pop up. Huge Grunt (sorry, Hugh Grant) is a bachelor Prime Minister attracted to a tea girl (Martine McCutcheon). Alan Rickman is a boss considering an affair with his predatory secretary, despite the consequences of cheating on his upright wife (Emma Thompson - excellent). Liam Neeson is a just-widowed stepfather trying to bond with his late wife's son. Colin Firth is a cuckolded writer who moves to a house in Provence, where he falls for his Portuguese maid. Bill Nighy is an over-the-hill rock star trying to revive his career with a Christmas novelty tune.

Perhaps it's me (usually is), but this film was a big disappointment – little drama, flat one-dimensional characters, no chemistry between the stars, and a lot of the humour based on four letter words. Colin Firth's scenes with Portuguese actress Lucia Moniz are the most touchingly romantic in the entire movie and provide the only truly "happy end".

If you haven't seen it already, do take a look. It's good Christmas candyfloss, sweet but with no substance. It left both Jacquie and me feeling flat and wondering what the hype had really been about.

If you don't already know this website, it's a place where you can catch up with old friends. You register (free) and add some information about yourself. It started with people making contact with old schoolfriends, and I suspect that this is still the real core of it – the full range from infant school to university is represented. But there are now groups to do with social clubs, sports teams, the military, the workplace, even streets and pubs! Even if you have contributed before, it'll be worthwhile having another look. There's always new people signing on, and there's probably new information you could add about yourself. For a modest subscription (£7.50 pa.) you can take part in some extra activities like an on-line message board and unlimited emails.

The latter says it's the largest of it's kind in the UK, but possibly a better known international service is that provided by the Morman Church via the website www.familysearch.org I didn't have a great deal of time to explore this but I could see that as well as giving a lot of detailed advice on how to go about researching your ancestry, there is an enormous database of records of births, marriages and deaths that can be searched on-line. They have the American 1880, the UK 1881 and the Canadian 1881 censuses amongst others and it seemed to respond pretty quickly to me.
