### ST EDMUNDSBURY BOROUGH COUNCIL

### A Message from Angela Rushen, St Edmundsbury Borough Councillor for Chedburgh Ward.

I have again been given £2,500 of Locality money to be spent in my Ward to help promote community spirit and to get villagers together. I have now distributed all of my money and wanted you to know how this has been spent. Each village in my Ward has been given £500.

**Chedburgh:** Two hundred pounds to help establish the Community Choir through the purchase of song books and help towards the cost of hiring the Erskine Centre. A further £300 to buy new kitchen utensils for the Erskine Centre.

**Chevington:** £68.95 to buy a pavement sign, ('A' Board) which will be used to advertise functions in the hall. The rest of the money will go towards upgrading the PA system in the Village Hall.

**Rede:** £180 to set up the new Craft and Chat Group in the village hall. £320 to fund a large mural, created by the village which will be hung in the village hall to separate the kitchen from the rest of the hall when completed. It will be incorporated with the Rede Arts & Craft Day to be held in June 2016 to coincide with the Queen's Birthday celebrations.

**Hawstead:** £500 to set up a Family Games Club, including the purchase of several games and initial help to hire the village hall.

**Whepstead:** £400 to buy a projector for the community centre, and to help fund speakers for some of the clubs. £100 to the new Ladies Social Group and to help with hiring charges.

The Locality money scheme will be repeated next year, so can I ask you all to think about your projects and contact me so we can discuss the possibility of some locality budget funding? I am looking forward to working with you all once again to spend this money where it is needed to enhance our already lovely villages.

# POLICE CONNECT

Keeping you informed, keeping your community safe

Police across the region are currently investigating a small spate of burglaries where elderly people have been targeted by groups of men.

The men often claim that work is required on the property and may force their way into the house where they steal cash or other valuables.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind people how to stay safe at home.

Please take this opportunity to speak with elderly friends, relatives and neighbours and make sure that they are aware how to keep themselves safe at home.

### **LOCK**

- Always keep your house secure, even when you are at home.
- Keep doors locked and windows shut, especially if you are not in the room.
- Make sure your back garden is secure too by keeping the back gate locked.

### **STOP**

If someone knocks at the door, stop and think if you are expecting a visitor. If
not, do not feel under any obligation to answer the door, even if the caller has
seen you.

### **CHAIN**

Always put the chain on the door before you answer it, even if you are
expecting a caller. It gives you more control over the conversation and also
makes it much harder for someone to force their way in. It is fine to say
something like 'Thank you for letting me know. I will contact my builder right
away' and then shut and lock the door.

### **CHECK**

- Always ask for a photo identification card and take your time to check it, even if you are expecting the caller.
- Make sure the photograph looks like the person at the door.
- Take your time to call the company using a phone number you already have. A genuine caller won't mind waiting.
- You can always ask them to come back at an arranged time when you can have a friend or relative with you.
- Never buy or sell anything at your door.

### NOT SURE? DON'T OPEN THE DOOR!

- Remember, if you are not sure about the caller, do not open the door and do call police on 101 (or 999 in an emergency) if you are concerned for your safety.
- If you think the caller is suspicious and may target someone else vulnerable in the neighbourhood, please call police immediately on 999 and give as much detail as you can about the person, the clothing they were wearing, details of any vehicle etc.

You'll see older reports on this page as well, the oldest being 1997-8. If I can track down any older ones (probably in the Suffolk Records Office) I'll add them but unfortunately I don't know when Hawstead first participated in this scheme.

I recently attended the annual 'get-together' arranged in Elmswell by Suffolk Local History Council and learned that the Suffolk scheme for a team of volunteer 'recorders' based in villages (and wards in towns) is almost unique. Elsewhere in the country there may be Local History Societies (as indeed there are in Suffolk) but almost nowhere else is there a coordinated attempt to record events on a local basis for posterity and use by future historians!

Unfortunately it can be difficult to get people to volunteer for this task and the organisers are always looking to fill gaps – indeed of approximately 500 parishes in the county only about 60% currently have a history recorder. If you have friends in Nowton, Horringer or Great Whelnetham who you think could be persuaded to take on this task, please let me know as they're all without a recorder.

### LIFE DRAWING AT HAWSTEAD VILLAGE HALL



### HAWSTEAD APPRECIATION AND TASTING SOCIETY (WINE CLUB)

On the 31st March our presentation was 'Really Useful Wines' hosted by Norman and Ann. These were taken from a pamphlet provided by Majestic designed to help with food matching, impressing your guests, sparking conversation or simply being drunk as a treat. A New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc from Marlborough called Massey Dacta (yes, you guessed a child's way of saying Massey Ferguson Tractor) came top in our opinion, followed by a very unusual Rosé Port, which is traditionally served chilled as an aperitif. It actually turned into a 'Really Useful Evening' as well as being a lot of fun.

Andy and Angela Parrett introduced some South American wines at the monthly meeting of HATS on April 29th, the inspiration having come from an article in the Saturday Times by that newspaper's wine critic, Jane MacQuitty. She opined that "canny British consumers have been making a beeline for good, ordinary Argentine Malbec for several years now" so we decided to join that club! In the end we had 4 Malbec's, three red and one rose; three from Argentina and one from Mexico (would you believe!) For whites we had two from Chile and two from Argentina, comprising one each of the varieties Pinot Grigio, Gewürztraminer, Riesling and the native Argentinian 'Torrontés'. All were sampled in the usual atmosphere of conviviality and none was considered sub-standard. Overall the favourite was the Chilean Gewürztraminer supplied by Peatlings with the runner up the red Santa Julia Malbec from Waitrose.

### HAWSTEAD READING GROUP

Our March meeting was held at Judy Carter's where we had very nice mini dough ball canapés and homemade biscuits.

Our book for discussion was "The Cuckoo's Calling" by Robert Galbraith aka J.K. Rowling.

When a troubled model falls to her death from a snow-covered Mayfair balcony, it is assumed that she committed suicide. However, her brother has his doubts and calls in private investigator Cormoran Strike. A war veteran wounded both physically and psychologically, Strike's life is in disarray. This case gives him a financial lifeline but at a personal cost. The more he delves into the young model's complex world the darker things get - and the closer he gets to terrible danger ....

Although there are some pretty awful characters we all liked Strike and his assistant Robin and enjoyed the book as an old fashioned detective story with a twist at the end!

In April we met at Jo Butt's where we had a very good turnout and enjoyed Jo's yummy sausage rolls! The book we discussed was "The Girl You Left Behind" by Jo Jo Moyes. In this novel two young women, separated by a century, are united in their determination to fight for the thing they love most - whatever the cost! In 1916 French artist Edouard leaves his wife Sophie to fight at the Front. When her town falls to the Germans his portrait of Sophie stirs the heart of the local Commandant and causes her to risk everything - her family, reputation and life - in the hope of seeing her true love one last time.

Nearly a century later Sophie's portrait is given to Liv by her young husband shortly before his sudden death. When the painting's dark and passion torn history is revealed, Liv discovers that the first spark of love she has felt since she lost him is threatened .....!

We found it an easy and interesting read covering the issues surrounding art stolen during wartime although we thought there were a few timeline issues!

Our next meeting is at Penny Barham's on Wednesday 4th May at 7.30 pm when we shall be discussing "The Heroes' Welcome" by Louisa Young.
