BURY ST EDMUNDS TOUR GUIDES

Have you enjoyed a tour of historic Bury St Edmunds?

Which of Bury St Edmunds historic buildings has been used as a prison and a police station and what is the Royal connection at St Mary's Church?

The answers can be found on a Bury St Edmunds town tour.

Tourism is big business in Bury St Edmunds with 724,000 trips a year, while the value of tourism to the local economy has been calculated as more than £45million.

Now, following investment by St Edmundsbury Borough Council, the town has just recruited 13 new green badge tour guides. Each has taken part in an eight month national Institute of Tourist Guiding course, culminating in a written exam and two practical assessments.

The 13 volunteers will lead tour groups specifically in Bury St Edmunds and take the total number of local tour guides in the town up to 25.

Cllr Alaric Pugh, St Edmundsbury's Cabinet Member for Planning and Growth said: "There is such a rich and exciting history to Bury St Edmunds and many of the buildings, the tapestry of these tales, still stand all around us. These tour guides are all volunteers who are enthusiastic about bringing this history to life for the hundreds of thousands of visitors that come to Bury St Edmunds each year and boost the local economy.

"All of this is part of our wider work with our key partners in tourism to encourage visitors to come to West Suffolk throughout the year, to stay longer, recommend the area to their friends, and of course to book up to come back again."

Tours are held daily at 2pm during May and June and twice a day from July to September at 11am and 2pm and cost just £5. The tours, which are also available in French and German start from the Tourist Information Point on Angel Hill.

Mike Dean, Chair of the Bury Association of Tour Guides, said: "During the height of season we welcome up to four coach tours a day to Bury St Edmunds. Many of our visitors are from the United States and across Europe, as well of course from other parts of the UK.

"I think Bury St Edmunds has so much to offer, whether it's the history of the Abbey which was once the fourth largest building in the whole of Christendom, the birth of Magna Carta, and St Edmund who was once our king and patron saint. We also have the final resting place of Royalty at St Mary's Church, the intriguing history of Moyse's Hall, The Nutshell, once the smallest pub in the World, the

stunning Cupola House rising like a phoenix from the ashes, and the Medieval Grid – the layout of the historic town centre which has gone on to be replicated across the United States in places such as New York.

"On top of this we also have the magnificent Cathedral, Theatre Royal, the only example of a Regency playhouse left in this country, both of which run their own tours.

The town is extremely lucky to have such a dedicated team of nationally accredited guides acting as ambassadors for this beautiful area of Suffolk."

TEAM GB AND ARGENTINA BECKON FOR BEN!

At just 17, villager Ben Pamplin has qualified as the number 1 men's freestyle C1 kayaker for Team GB to travel to Argentina for the 2017 World Championships. He'll be taking part this November/ December in what will be Argentina's summer, so it looks set to be very hot and arid. The whitewater course is close to the town of San Juan, and Ben will be travelling with his dad Chris and Aunt. It may be a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to represent his country and, despite being during his mock A-levels at County Upper and university interview period, he has decided that this honour is worth the added problems it will cause. With the support of County Upper, he'll be making the best of what will be a difficult few weeks academically!

Freestyle kayaking is performed on wave features on whitewater courses, so Ben has to travel at least weekly to the Olympic course at Lee Valley, with extra trips to Nottingham, Reading and Cardiff in between. He began kayaking during a middle school trip organised by St Louis Middle, and took it further with Sudbury Canoe Club. Now he has a passion for the sport and would gladly spend every day riding the waves.

Ben is seeking sponsorship for his trip to South America. There's no funding for Team GB kayaking, so all the costs fall to him.

HAWSTEAD READING GROUP

In July the meeting was held at Angela Parrett's where the book for discussion was "The Handmaid's Tale" by Margaret Attwood. Offred is a Handmaid in the Republic of Gilead - a dystopian world where a theocracy has taken over the U.S. government and women have lost all their rights. The house where Ofred works is run by a married commander where she is kept for reproductive purposes in an era of declining births due to sterility from pollution and sexually transmitted disease. She has very little freedom except for supervised shopping trips and the Handmaids live under a very cruel regime. There are frequent flashbacks from before and during the beginning of the revolution to her relationship with her husband Luke and their daughter and her indoctrination into life as a Handmaid. The group as a whole found it a well written though difficult read with a disturbing storyline and the characters were not particularly likeable in this new ruthless society. Now made into a major TV series Atwood's vision when she wrote the book in 1985 is all too relevant to the world today and a future that could happen!!

The August meeting was held at Penny Barham's - where we were a full complement of members for the first time since Christmas - and discussed "A Good Catch" by Fern Britton. The book is about a lifetime of friendship, a lifetime of secrets. As they grew up in the Cornish fishing village of Trevay, life for four friends seemed all mapped out. Jesse Behenna would marry beautiful Greer Clovelly uniting two great Cornish families. Loveday Carter was happy to live in Greer's shadow whilst Jesse's best friend Mickey loved her from afar. What seems so simple in the innocence of youth is far more complicated than it appears. Under intense pressure from his family to marry Greer, Jesse faces an agonising choice, one which could change the course of all their futures. In later years secrets and lies break to the surface in Trevay, threatening to wreck old friendships and possibly lives too.

There was a very brief discussion on the merits of the book. One of several books by Fern Britton set in Cornwall, this is a reasonable holiday read but the group on the whole found it a bit trite and contrived although the ending was a bit of a surprise!

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 6th September at Ruth McKay's where we shall be discussing "My Brilliant Friend" by Elena Ferrante.

HAWSTEAD APPRECIATION AND TASTING SOCIETY (HATS)

In July we have an informal meeting where each couple brings a bottle. What variety we experienced, with one made from Hawstead grapes back in 2008. This was sadly well past its sell-by date! Other whites sampled were a South African Sauvignon Blanc called 'The Flower Garden' (chosen for its pretty label!), an Austrian Gruner Veltliner and a Chilean Pedro Ximenez, which most of us assumed to be a Sherry. Only one Rose was brought, a Baron Gassier from Provence, which most thought delicious.

We moved on to reds and tried two Italian, both a hefty 14.5%, a Chateau Neuf du Pape and a South African Shiraz/Cabernet Sauvignon mix. This was from Boschendal, a place that several members of the group had visited on holiday.

We couldn't have had a more varied selection if we tried!

August was equally as exciting with John and Geraldine having met with one of Adnams wine buyers, Alistair Marshall and successfully obtained his choice of current Adnams wines. There were four white and four red. Our favourite white was a Rueda Blanco from Spain at a not unreasonable $\mathfrak{L}8.99$. The second choice of white was a French Pont de Gassac being a blend of Grenache Blanc, Sauvignon Blanc, Chardonnay and Voignier. This had a price tag of $\mathfrak{L}12.99$, which we thought too expensive. Another French from the Macon region followed and was rounded up by a New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc from one of the Marlborough Estates. This was a disappointment to those of us who enjoy the distinctive Marlborough Sauvignon taste.

In the red selection our favourite was a Chilean Petit Verdot, generally a grape not well-known to the group. The shock of the evening was a grand Claret from Moulis-en-Medoc, by far the most expensive and given the lowest mark.

Congratulations to John and Geraldine for all their 'homework' which was much appreciated.

We next meet on September 28th with our hosts being Nikki and Lucy.
