

A TRIBUTE TO SIMON by Lesley Carey

This is what Lesley had to say about Simon at his funeral last week.

My name is Lesley and to those of you who do not know me Simon and I were Church Wardens of this lovely church for longer than I like to remember.

We both shared a Christian faith and mostly enjoyed the privilege of being caretakers of this place.

We both had different strengths and talents.

We were a good team.

Sylvia, Simon's wife was Sacristan here for years, so they were both part of our small 'Church Family' from the time they moved into the village.

After Sylvia's death, Simon worked very hard to (and I don't think the family will mind me saying) to reinvent himself to live without her.

At a fundraising party some of my friends mentioned the U3A. How he embraced this is evident in so many members being here. He lost weight, joined at least three walking groups, liking nothing

more than walking and the outdoors.

He played badminton. He joined the science group and became a member of the newly formed choir, who are singing here today.

He loved dancing and went regularly to lessons and Tea Dances, getting over his 'two left feet' problem that most men seem to have.

He loved his yearly trips boating on the Broads.

We had great fun making Cider. Gathering what seemed like tonnes of apples from his and my orchard; pressing them and using the waste to feed the 'Village pigs'. We were trying for The Good Life. Caroline and Peter you must have gallons of the stuff at home.

We shared another love – bonfires. It seems to be a family trait as Caroline and I have already had several. One we had at the back of the church was so large it could be seen burning from the Nowton Road, causing neighbours to call in to check that the church was not on fire!

Pyromania must run in families.

He was a bee-keeper and in the 'infamous shed' that he was building had incorporated hives for them. Hopefully we will still paint 'The Bee Hotels' on one of its sides.

Latterly Simon and I went on a couple of Pilgrimages. Mark and some of our friends are here today. Firstly we went to the Holy Land, which was so meaningful to everyone. The Bible came to life and we all grew as Christians.

Simon made a film which we showed at a Lent Lunch; we must show it again.

Then this year we went to India on a Faith tour. Amazing. Some of us went Tuk Tuk racing, became curiosities for photo shoots by the locals and loved it! Simon was going to go again next year to try and find where Sylvia's family had lived.

He enjoyed history researching, both into his own family and for local people.

He had endless talents.

Simon was a quiet, reserved man, but underneath he was so generous of spirit, someone you could rely on. A GREAT FRIEND.

Hedging with Simon

As with so many other tasks in the village Simon was always quietly encouraging and willing to put time and effort in to help get hedging jobs done. It was always a pleasure to work with him and I will miss his companionship in tackling hedges to lay and little projects to complete. I always particularly liked the no fuss arrangements-

Me: I wondered about laying that young hedge at the back of the churchyard extension? What would the churchwardens feel about that?

Simon: Well yes, that would be good.

Me: I could do it this weekend – would that be any good?

S: Yes, fine.

Me: Well I'll probably come down on Saturday mid-morning – I've got some other things to fit in too.

S: Yes so have I.

That was it.

So on the day I'd roll up at what seemed roughly midmorning and somehow within 5 minutes or so Simon would also arrive. There he'd be there getting out tools, sharpening billhooks. Then the day would pass in a sporadic chatter of this and that whilst we cut, laid, trimmed, staked and wove... The work of each of us complementing the other. In among what was often a chilled, mellow day of physical work Simon would release snippets of the most surprising gems of knowledge and experience from the far side of the hedge into the winter air.

I will particularly miss his keen interest in such a large range of subjects, his quiet confidence in his faith and his steady approach to life. Somehow being with him one could feel that here was a good man: competent and willing to help in so many ways. I can't say I knew him anything like as much as I would have liked- Simon wasn't a man to be pigeon holed. Here was a man who would suddenly raise his head, turn his face into bright eyes and beaming smile and before you knew what was happening he would have quietly put up an astro-turf hedge on the side of his workshop!

When I first joined the Christian Cruising and Sailing Association, I was in my twenties and living in Hertfordshire.





A PLEA TO ALL DOG OWNERS

Gorgeous isn't he?

Most of us love our dogs very much but they are totally reliant on us. They cannot clear up after themselves.

It has become evident recently that some dog owners are less than responsible in cleaning up their dog's mess when out on walks. Our beautiful Hawstead walk from the church to the Cranks is suffering particularly. It is becoming very unpleasant along the field edge paths. PLEASE BE A RESPONSIBLE OWNER AND PICK UP YOUR DOG'S MESS.

Hawstead Parish Tree Scheme

The Parish Council is funding a scheme providing free native trees and shrubs to anyone who will plant them where they will enhance Hawstead and make it an even better place to live.

Do you have somewhere that would benefit from planting a tree or two?

This can be on any scale. But don't worry if you only have a small space. Garden trees are vital and make up about a quarter of the UK's non-woodland trees. A mature tree brings shade, privacy and birdsong into your garden and can even help raise a property's value. Why not come up with a creative planting plan?

Ideas could include:

- Landscape enhancement: where the planting will enhance the wider landscape, add interest
 to particularly bare, open areas or perhaps where there was more tree cover in the past.
 Shrubs could gap up a thin hedge or trees could be planted which will mark a historic
 boundary or bank. The new planting should aim to be in character with and complement the
 existing native woody vegetation.
- Wildlife thickets for bird nesting. Gapping up and adding varied native species to spice up single species hedges with blossom and berries.
- Along ditches and water courses to help shade water courses. This can enhance wildlife and water quality.
- Plantings should be well suited to the location for scale, shade, moisture requirements etc. for the long term.

Small print: Tree provision will be from a provisional budget and at the Parish Council's discretion. Depending on amount of interest priority is likely to be given to places where plantings are visible by the public and enhance the local landscape and wildlife.

I'm very happy to chat about any ideas or provide any advice if wanted –it's a new scheme we'll have to just try it and see how it goes!

Tree species available (All native species which grow naturally in the village)

Large (to 30 metres tall)

Oak

Native black poplar big fast growing fairly rare native

Medium: (to 20m)

Field maple fine tree with bright yellow autumn colour

Wild cherry white blossom

Smaller trees: (to 10m)

Hawthornwhite blossom, berriesCrab applewhite blossom, berriesHollyevergreen, berries

Shrubs/hedge plants:

Hazel (to 10m) multi-stemmed, catkins & nuts

Blackthorn spreads by suckering to form a thorny thicket, sloes for gin...

Native dogwood red stems in winter, spreading by suckering roots

Spindle attractive orange and pink berries, spreads by suckering roots

Buckthorn food plant for yellow brimstone butterflies

Dog rose pale pink flowers, red hips

Field rose white flowers, hips

Wild privet suckering semi-evergreen

Trees and shrubs for wetter areas:

White willow (up to 30m)
Crack willow (up to 30m)

Aspen (to 25m) spreads via suckering roots

Alder (to 20m)
Grey willow (to 10m)
Goat willow (to 10m)

The summer got off to a dry start but only a handful of plants have succumbed to the harsh conditions and we will plant replacements this coming winter to help it on its way.

It will look more impressive in years to come like the other hedges we have planted in the area and hopefully make the area more of a pleasure for everyone. Thank you to all who helped, encouraged or gave us refreshments. From a few thin twigs planted among a pile of flints good things will come.

If people are up for a bit of bramble cutting and trimming we could lay the old hedge at the front of the Millennium Field this winter and open up a view to the small pond along the stream.

I'll hatch a plan for a nice bright frosty day!



HAWSTEAD OCCASIONAL WEATHER REPORT



The summer began with a flaming June, the warmest since that exceptional June of 1976, although this month was substantially wetter - 82.9 mm compared to 9.5mm in 1976. Thereafter the summer was unremarkable with no heatwave until the August Bank Holiday weekend when the thermometer registered 27.5 c (81.5 F). Following a drier than average winter period rainfall, forecasts of drought did not materialise owing to adequate summer rainfall - 218 mm which was well above the average for these three months of 167mm. Since the third week in September rainfall has been light though several deep depressions brought heavy rain to more northerly and western areas.

October recorded the lowest rainfall figure since 1995, just 18.5 mm, but incomparable with the dry October of 1972 when a mere 2.5 mm were recorded. Mid-September was notably cool heralding the onset of autumn. Fruits both of the hedgerow and garden had ripened earlier than usual. Temperatures held up well during October. On the 16th, 22.8c was recorded ,the warmest day since late August , and moreover an unusually high figure for so late in the season .

One marked feature of the period from mid-May to late October has been the paucity of cool nights. After a balmy summer and autumn I have a feeling, totally unsupported scientifically, that the winter ahead will bring some sharp weather, so be prepared!

HAWSTEAD READING GROUP

Our September meeting was at Ruth Mackay's where she entertained us very well. The book for discussion was Angela's choice of "My Brilliant Friend" by Elena Ferrante. The first of four in a series the story begins in 1950's Naples in a poor but vibrant neighbourhood. Two friends, Elena and Lila are growing up on these tough streets and rely on each other ahead of anyone or anything else. As the embodiment of a nation undergoing momentous change Ferrante tells the story of a city and a country as it is transformed in ways that also transforms the lives of our two friends.

A couple in the group really enjoyed it and the depiction of Naples at that time and were keen to read the next in the series but most of us found it confusing with such a lot of characters to keep up with and their relationship to each other! It was also a shame "My Brilliant Friend" did not "stand alone" and needed the reader to follow on to the next book in the series as there was no proper conclusion!

In October we met at Rosemary Harrison's where we had very nice canapés and Mike served our drinks! Our book for discussion was "Spitfire Women of World War II" by Giles Wittell. A departure from our usual fiction this is the incredible story of a wartime sisterhood of women pilots who took exceptional risks to fly Spitfires, Hurricanes and Lancasters to the front lines. These women pilots of Air Transport Auxiliary came from all countries and backgrounds and, although not allowed into combat, they demonstrated astonishing bravery in their supporting role. Flying unarmed without radios or instruments and at the mercy of the weather and enemy aircraft they delivered battle-ready planes to their male counterparts, the fighter pilots of the RAF. The story of these remarkable women pilots - among them Amy Johnson and Lettuce Curtis - is a fitting tribute to their spirit and valour in the Second World War.

We had mixed feelings as a group as the author's style was rather disjointed and it was difficult to keep up with each individual girl so it might have been better to dedicate a chapter to each one. That withstanding it gave a very good insight into a part of the wartime effort we knew very little about and it is interesting how mundane they found their lives post wartime! It also highlighted how the women were treated as inferior to the men who still received all the accolades! It is interesting to note that Giles Wittell also wrote "Bridge of Spies!"

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 1st November at Sonja Monks' where we shall be reviewing "Our Endless Numbered Days" by Claire Fuller.

HAWSTEAD APPRECIATION AND TASTING SOCIETY (HATS)

The theme for **September** was "Should you judge a wine by its label?" *Nikki* and *Becca* did a great job in choosing some really fun 'animal' bottles of wine. The whites were represented by sheep, mule, whale and frog and the reds hog, cockerel, porcupine and elephant. The red Porcupine Ridge, a Syrah grape from South Africa was judged as the best wine of the evening. It is readily available and a snip at £7.99. The white 'sheep' was a close contender being Pecorino Terrestrial de Chieti from Italy and cost £5.99.

An interesting snippet we learnt was animal branded wines sell particularly well in the U.S.A. There is apparently a segment of consumers who don't wish to have to take wine too seriously! Maybe this could be said for HATS members?!

Andy and Angela did a marvellous job in **October** informing us about Italian wines. Quite a surprise to most of us was that Italy is the top wine producing country in the world, followed by France and Spain. We tasted wines from Piedmont, Tuscany, Campania, Veneto, Emilia-Romagna, Abruzzo, Puglia and Sicily, basically from the very top of Italy's thigh to the toe. Our most northern wine from the Piedmont area near Turin was a Gavi DOCG Gavi from Waitrose. The favourite red was a Sesti Grangiovese from Montalcino in Tuscany. Sadly both these wines were the most expensive ones we sampled at nearly £15 a bottle.

Italy has several unique grapes and the Puglian Passitivo wine from Aldi made solely of Primitivo grapes was deemed excellent value at £7.99.

Thank you to all who have contributed to the group with their individual presentations and entered into the spirit wholeheartedly again this year.
