Your Community Council: shaping what we do

This month a residents' survey is coming to your door aimed at gathering information about how you use your village hall and play area, and how you would like to see it develop over the next few years. What events/activities do you enjoy? What would you like to see offered within the village? What sorts of activities would attract you into the village hall? How can we help the community to make better use of this village resource? We need to hear from you – children and adults – so that we can gain a representative sample of opinion to guide the hall's future.

In May each year, you have the opportunity to elect your Community Council for the following 12 months. Your elected Council members are charged with preserving the community's village hall and the nearby fenced play area. Specifically, the current Object of Hawstead Community Council is as follows:



'To provide and manage recreational facilities, playing

fields, playgrounds, community centres, social facilities and other amenities of a similar nature in the interests of social welfare for the benefit of the community residing in the parish of Hawstead Suffolk, the advancement of education, the protection of health, the relief of poverty, distress or sickness and in pursuing any objects which are now or hereafter may be deemed in law to be charitable by improving the conditions of life of the persons for whom the facilities are primarily intended'

Your elected Community Council is manned by volunteers from the village. They spend their time focusing on trying to meet the different elements of this objective. The upcoming survey will be designed to help you think



about whether the village hall and play area are meeting your needs, and how we might best move forward. If you are interested, we'll also give you a summary of the hall's usage since 2018 (ignoring 2020 and 2021 for obvious reasons), and will also try to communicate the financial demands associated with maintaining these valuable village resources.

Churchyard Tidy Ups 2022

It's nearly the end of the grass-growing season, so just one more scheduled Churchyard Tidy Up is needed for 2022. We've been blessed with some amazing weather for the majority of our churchyard sessions, and here's hoping that 22 October is no different. Gather together your gardening tools and join the enthusiastic team of volunteers for a morning of mowing, strimming, hedge-cutting and perhaps, even, a bonfire!



Hawstead's final churchyard tidy up for 2022 will take place on Saturday 22 October, starting at around 10am. Work usually finishes by 12.30pm, especially if there's lots of help. Spearheaded by villager Andy Parrett, these monthly dates in the churchyard have fostered a lovely team spirit and also helped the churchyard to look spick and span all summer.

The whole church team would like to say a special 'BIG THANK YOU' to all those who have turned up on one or more occasions armed with gardening equipment and gloves. Without the support of volunteers, the churchyard would very quickly become overtaken by nettles and weeds, and fall into a state of disrepair. We have a church and churchyard of which we can be truly proud... let's keep it this way.

Bringing the Stars Closer to Home...

If the night sky fascinates you but you don't know your Little Bear from your Big Bear, why not find out more with the Athenaeum Astronomy Association?

Whether it's the recent images from the James Webb Space Telescope of Neptune's rings, or discovering NASA deliberately crashed a spacecraft into an asteroid, it may have got you wondering about the Universe and our night sky.

Now is a great time to stop and stare at the night sky. You may see the Orionids meteor shower, planets Jupiter and Saturn, the Pleiades star cluster and much more. You may already love stargazing or would like to learn more about the planets, our moon, or deep space objects, like galaxies and star clusters. Perhaps you're curious about astrophotography or simply enjoy discussing space and the Universe with like-minded people. Whatever the reasons, your local astronomy group is here to help.

The **Athenaeum Astronomy Association** (AAA) is a group of local enthusiasts of all levels and interests who can guide you on how to observe with the naked eye, binoculars and telescopes, how to star hop and provide tips for observing. We usually meet at Whepstead Community Centre, but for a brief period we are enjoying the facilities at Hawstead Village Hall. We meet every other Wednesday at 7.30pm and, now that it's getting

darker much earlier, we will hopefully be spending most of our time observing the night sky. We'd love you to join us, but if you're not sure astronomy is for you, just come along and enjoy the first couple of meetings on us for free. Our next meeting is Wednesday 12th October at Hawstead Village Hall from 7.30pm with a presentation on Archaeology and astronomy and What's in the Night Sky.



Whitsun Fayre, Bury St Edmunds

There's a second opportunity to learn more about Astronomy, again free to Hawstead residents and any students studying GCSE Astronomy at local schools. On Wednesday 9 November from 7.30pm the Athenaeum Astronomy is welcoming guest speaker Mr Paul Whiting (Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society and Chartered Scientist) to give a talk on 'Radio Astronomy'.

Radio Astronomy is the technique of looking at astronomical objects using the long wavelength portion of the electromagnetic spectrum, so using wavelengths beyond infra-red and undetectable to the human eye. It was first used in 1933, and has been responsible for the detection of objects such as Quasars, Pulsars and Radio Galaxies. It was also the technique that first detected




Cosmic Background Radiation, the most important step in confirming the Big Bang Theory relating to the origin of the Universe. Radio Astronomy is also used closer to home to map the sun and planets, etc. Famous radio telescopes in the UK include Jodrell Bank and, closer to home, the Mullard Radio Astronomy Observatory (right below) just outside Cambridge. The talk will last anywhere from 45 minutes to an hour depending on questions. Attending the session will give you a flavour of the Association's interests and offer a mentally stimulating evening.

The group does as much observation as it can in the darker months, although weather is the controlling factor in the winter. Interspersed with direct observing are some thought-provoking outside speakers. The Association also has a number of members who give



lectures, with recent topics including Galaxies and the Future of the Universe, and Stars and Constellations

Visible at this Time of the Year. So do pop down to the village hall for one of these sessions and see what the



Athenaeum Astronomy Association is all about. And you might even get a cup of tea/coffee and a biscuit if you are lucky!


Here's to next year and more gargantuan sunflowers (but not quite Day of the Triffids stuff!).

5* Pumpkin Soup

One of the tastiest soups around is pumpkin soup. And at this time of year it has the added bonus of using up all the scraps from the pumpkins as you carve out your scary faces. Here's a recipe from BBC Good Food rated 5* by more than 200 reviewers. You can find many variants of the recipe online.

You will need:

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- x2 onions finely chopped
- 1kg of pumpkin, peeled, deseeded and chopped into chunks
- 700ml veggie or chicken stock
- 150ml double cream
- Croutons & toasted pumpkin seeds to serve if you like

Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in a large saucepan, then gently cook 2 finely chopped onions for 5 mins, until soft but not coloured. Add 1kg pumpkin or squash, cut into chunks, to the pan, then carry on cooking for 8-10 mins, stirring occasionally until it starts to soften and turn golden. Pour 700ml vegetable or chicken stock into the pan and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, then simmer for 10 mins until the squash is very soft. Pour 150ml double cream into the pan, bring back to the boil, then purée with a hand blender. Pour the soup through a fine sieve for an extra-velvety consistency. The soup can be frozen for up to 2 months.


A New Holiday Venture Starts in West Suffolk

A couple of Sundays ago I was invited to attend a special event at **The Star** pub in Lidgate, a village just a few miles west of us here in Suffolk. It was billed as an occasion to celebrate the start of Autumn, and promised 'local food and drinks'.

This sounded like a good idea! We know this pub from having enjoyed meals (and drinks) there in the past, so Angela and I made a diary note and duly turned up on the appointed day. Many invitations must have been sent out



(perhaps including the whole population of



What we hadn't been told was that this event was

being jointly hosted by the pub and a company called 'Outdoor Inns'. The owners of The Star have gone into partnership with this company as 'a cost-free way for independent publicans to increase revenue and extend their offering'. This has been done by allowing Outdoor Inns to place two glamping pods on a lawn area adjacent to the pub (with a third to be added at a later date if the venture is successful).

These pods are substantially larger than the Wigwam versions at Maglia Rosso in Hawstead, accommodating 4–6 people at a time. One pod was open to visitors, and we found it most attractive, with two twin bedrooms, two bathrooms and a convertible sofa in the lounge area. There was an outside deck area with seating and a small kitchen – small because people staying there will be encouraged to have their main meals in the pub.



The Star is the first location that Outdoor Inns has developed, and they have a number of others in the pipeline. They are looking for suitable rural locations in English counties which have ready access to attractive countryside for rural pursuits. They see a gap in the market for small groups of friends wanting to go on short-

stay holidays together to enjoy activities like walking, cycling, angling, golf, etc. What better place to stay than at a pleasant and characterful country pub serving good food and real ale?

The company has already appraised an initial list of 9,000 pubs in 30 counties, which resulted in a shortlist of 200. In conversation with the Outdoor Inns representatives present, Adrian and Josh, it was clear that their aim is one of 'win-win'. In an environment where many rural or village pubs are struggling, they are potentially helping to increase footfall. So, for instance, the landlord of The Star had been restricting the opening hours to just 5 days each week. Now the pub is open every day, and the restaurant is open 6 days per week, plus lunchtime on Sunday. They are hoping to attract groups of people (ideally but not exclusively) in the 18–80 age

range to come and stay in the pods and spend the evenings in the pub.

When you read this I will have returned from a long weekend in Caernarfon with a group of friends, hopefully enjoying the scenery of Snowdonia during some energetic walks. If there had been a set-up similar to the one I have described above, it would have been much more enticing than the Premier Inn we booked into!

What is the Energy Price Cap?

There's been a lot of confusion over what an energy price cap means and what an 'average' energy bill might look like this winter. Here, Anne clarifies the position.

What is the energy price guarantee?

The energy price guarantee replaces the previous 'energy price cap'. It is essentially a limit on what you pay for one unit of gas or electricity (measured in kilowatt hours, i.e. kWh).



The current caps, effective from the 1 October, are:

- 34p per kWh of electricity
- 10p per kWh of gas

The cap only applies to each unit of gas or electricity that you use. It is not a limit on your total energy bill. It means that homes in Great Britain should see average energy



bills of £2,500. If you use more energy, your bills will be higher (and vice versa). Remember, your bills will also include a standing charge on top of the cost of the energy you use.

The energy price guarantee only applies to people on a default tariff (known as a standard variable tariff or SVT), so that is anyone who does not have a fixed-term energy deal in place.

What if you are on a fixed rate tariff?

If you're on a fixed rate tariff, you will see the unit rate of your energy reduced if it is over 34p per unit for electricity or 10p per unit for gas. The reduction you can get is limited up to 17p per kWh for electricity and 4p per kWh for gas. Customers on fixed tariffs where the unit prices are already below the energy price guarantee will not have their rates discounted because their energy bills will already be below the £2,500 average.

What is the energy bills support scheme discount?

The energy bills support scheme discount is the £400 discount promised by the Government. It is being applied automatically to all eligible households (i.e. all homes with a domestic electricity connection). Because the scheme operates automatically, you won't need to apply for it. Be aware that any letters, emails or texts about applying for the discount may well be a scam.

The total £400 discount will be applied to your monthly bills like this:



This is a government discount which you don't pay back



- £66 taken off in October and November
- £67 taken off in December, January, February and March.

If you pay by direct debit, you'll receive either a reduction in the direct debit amount or a refund after the debit is collected.



Help with energy bills

If you're in debt, some energy companies have grants that can help you to pay it. They include EDF, Bulb, Shell and E.ON. You can find a full list at www.citizensadvice.org.uk/debt-and-money/budgeting/budgeting/get-help-with-bills. If your supplier isn't on the list, contact them. Don't ignore it.

Most suppliers will be willing to work with you to an agreed plan.

If your supplier can't give you a grant, the British Gas Energy Trust offers grants to everyone, and not just customers. To apply, you'll need to have spoken to a debt advisor first (find out more at Citizens Advice).

Other funding options available, include:

- Cost of living payment (£650) to be eligible, you'll need to be in receipt of certain tax credits
 and low-income benefits; find out more at www.gov.uk/guidance/cost-of-living-payment#low-income-benefits-and-tax-credits
- Pensioner cost of living payment and winter fuel payment these payments sit alongside each
 other, so if you're eligible, you could receive anything between £250 and £600 to help pay bills.
