# Report: Authentic Curry Night in Hawstead

In all, £971 winged its way to St Nicholas Hospice following our fundraising Authentic Indian Curry Night at Hawstead Village Hall on 1 April. The hall was a-buzz with excitement and conversation all evening, with fabulous food and great company. Here's more about the evening...

Nearly 60 residents, family and friends joined us on Saturday 1 April to experience a traditional Indian meal, with all funds raised being split 80% to St Nicholas Hospice and 20% to Hawstead Community Council.

Cooked by villager Suzie Surti and family (who provided the curry for our Jubilee celebrations last summer), we were treated to a real taste of India. Suzie used some of her favourite family recipes to provide us with a delicious feast within a hall decorated with colourful saris and fairy lights, making a very special atmosphere.

The starter was a mixed platter of cauliflower pakora, sweetcorn chevdo, coconut raita and cucumber and mint raita, while the main course offered chole (chickpea), aloo sakh (potato curry), daal, butter chicken and rice. A few village takeaways were ordered too!

We also offered a raffle, with all monies raised (£355) going to St Nicholas Hospice. Thanks go to all those who donated prizes.

The event was organised by Amanda Lomas-Farley assisted by Ali Bovill, both from Hawstead Community Council. A small volunteer team, including Susanne White, Chris Pamplin and Lulu Surti, gathered in advance to decorate the hall and set the tables, and guests did a great job of tidying away afterwards. Thanks go to them all on behalf of the village and the charities concerned.

As mentioned, this event was a fundraiser primarily for St Nicholas Hospice. The Surti family not only invested their time in preparing and serving the meal, they also kindly donated all the food. This generous gift from the Surti family meant that we were able to send £971 to the St Nicholas Hospice charity as a donation for its amazing work, and keep £154 for Hawstead Community Council. All monies

fundraised for the Community Council are ploughed straight back into the village to help finance events like the triple-20s Christmas lunch, Christmas drinks for the whole village, and the children's parties, etc.

# Report: Hawstead Community Council's AGM

On Monday 15 May, Hawstead Community

Council and interested residents gathered at the village hall for the annual general meeting.

Reports were presented (see below) and the new Committee elected for 2023-24. Read below for the details.

After apologies and approval of the previous minutes, the annual reports from the Chair and Treasurer for 2022-23 were presented and are reproduced below.



#### Chair's Report 2022-23

Hawstead Village Hall is now open fully for business. The past 12 months have seen plenty of activity, both village events and private hires.

Community events for the year included a Spring Plant Fair in May, the Platinum Jubilee celebrations in June, our September Fete and Produce Show, a Halloween Tea Party, the Triple-20s Christmas Lunch, Christmas drinks for the village, a children's Christmas party and a Curry Night fundraising primarily for St Nicholas Hospice. For the village children, we also funded pantomime tickets for the under-12s, and Hawstead's Christmas Elves and Easter Bunnies made home deliveries of chocolate coins and Easter eggs to all children aged 16 and under.

Our regular weekly hirers have kept constant over the past 12 months, including three weekly yoga sessions, a Thursday night fitness class, and Hawstead Bowls Club on a Tuesday evening. In addition, the hall has continued to be used for a monthly events by the MND Association and our local wine appreciation group (HATS). The parish council has held its meetings in the main hall bimonthly, with some ad hoc smaller meetings accommodated in the meeting room. The meeting room is also being hired 3 days a week for private counselling sessions. West Suffolk Beekeeping Association has continued to use the hall for its spring training course, although its monthly meetings have moved elsewhere. Friday Night Fish & Chips in the hall car park has continued on a monthly basis.

Private hires have been dominated by 12 weddings during the summer of 2022, which we think is probably a post-COVID anomaly. We have also started limiting hires to non-residents to a minimum of 6 hours, because the volunteer work involved with smaller hires and the subsequent cleaning costs make them unviable.

We conducted a village consultation at the end of 2022 to engage with residents about their thoughts on the village hall and how the Community Council is working on their behalf. About one-third of households responded. In general, residents were happy with the village hall and play area, although a small minority were concerned about disturbance caused by some hall hires. We followed this consultation up with a clubs morning to try to convert the interest shown on paper for a number of new village clubs into real activity and change. Unfortunately very few residents came along. We have made very clear that villagers need to get together to create their own clubs and activities... the Community Council cannot do it all for them.

Following our consultation, we also made some changes to our bookings policy. It was made clear that these amendments would be reviewed annually in May by the incoming Community Council members. Since the start of 2023 we have offered free hall hire to the bowls club and HATS on the understanding that they are truly open to all villagers and not a closed group. We are also not currently charging the parish council for its use of the hall.

The Community Council has supported a number of charities with free hall hire. These have included Macmillan Cancer Support and St Nicholas Hospice. We have also worked with the local church team to offer a number of no-cost events for them, including the Advent service and Lent lunch.

Our Village Voice newsletter has continued, albeit published once every 2 months or thereabouts. We are still seeking a new volunteer to take it over.

At present our bank account is very healthy at in excess of £40,000 (and Louisa will report on that in a minute). This financial year we have spent money on the following:

- roof ridge tile repair/replacement
- a new kitchen floor
- a new picnic bench in the play area
- a new sound control system
- a new CCTV/internal camera system
- a new remote-access heating control system
- radiator pipework repair in the main hall
- replacement equipment for broken items after hires
- new Bluetooth connectivity and wireless reception in the village hall
- new curtains and blinds (awaiting delivery).

There is an ongoing issue with damage to the main hall floor caused by a radiator water leak which will be investigated further in the autumn. It is likely that a new floor for the main hall/corridor will be needed winter 2023/24. We had hoped to fully replace the play area barked surface this winter, but more important issues arose that required urgent attention and potentially financing.

As a Committee, JS has worked hard to manage building maintenance, helping to maintain the quality of the building fabric, fixtures and fittings. BB has offered his secretarial skills to keep minutes of our meetings, and ensured that the bins have been put out and brought back in for rubbish collection. LJ, our Treasurer, has worked hard to keep finances correctly accounted, as well as issuing bond refunds and



paying invoices. CM, ALF and AB have been focusing on social event management and community engagement, while AB has also been dropping into the hall weekly to ensure housekeeping tasks are completed. SW has remained as chair, and has also been managing the bookings while we continue to seek a new volunteer Bookings Clerk. We remain keen to find an efficient and long-term Bookings Clerk, hopefully supported by a flexible caretaker and a dynamic volunteer committee.

This May will see a number of changes to the Community Council that will hopefully share workload between more volunteers. A number of current members of the Management Committee are stepping away, but they are remaining involved in a more informal capacity so that skills and enthusiasm aren't lost. All four honorary positions will also have new incumbents. So with a few spaces on the Community Council Management Committee for 2023-24, we hope to see some new faces involved!



We also have a fabulous team of residents who support the elected Management Committee, as shown by our recent Coronation Tea Party. Of particular note are:

- JW, who has kindly audited our accounts and helped with mowing the cut areas around the village hall
- JWe, who has been cutting grass regularly in the play area during the spring and summer months to ensure everything remains smart and tidy
- CR and BM, who have effectively been on call all year in times of emergency with the building.

plus, of course, the host of villagers who rally to our call to arms when staging social events.

### **Treasurer's Report 2022-23**

#### **Overall Position**

This financial year we continue to recover from COVID restrictions. Bookings have continued, including weddings, and the current accounts stood at £46,539.24 on 13.04.23. This is a small increase from last year.

#### Income

- Hall rentals continue to make up the majority of our income and have increased from £23,530.50 to £26,776.49. This total includes income from regular bookings from yoga/fitness at £3,913 and counselling at £2,250. All should continue into the next financial year.
- The hire charge for weddings was raised in 2022 to £1300 and in 2023 to £1500 (although these price increases will take 1-2 years to
  - following through into the accounts). In the last financial year the hall took £19,025.00 from wedding hires before bond returns, caretaking and cleaning costs are removed.
- Income from the fete, plant fair (£305.80) and other events has continued. After costs, the fete raised £446 in 2022. This was in large part due to the decision not to run a silent auction, which usually raises £500+. There was also a lot of alcohol remaining after the event which was stored for future use at other events.



We received no grants this financial year.

#### **Expenditure**

Expenditure changes worth noting from the last financial year are:

• Maintenance costs have increased from £5,539.10 to £11,161.25. This includes the replacement of flooring in the kitchen, the replacement of damaged ridge tiles on the roof, the replacement of the CCTV system due to a failed power supply and the need to monitor images remotely, the replacement of the heating controls to



enable remote access and programming, the installation of a sound limiter to control event noise, and the improvement of Bluetooth and wireless connectivity to help at events. We have also added an extra picnic bench in the play area.

- Utilities, rates and waste collection costs have increased from £2,093.92 to £3,818.2. This includes the increase in costs of utilities and also two extra bins to accommodate extra rubbish in the summer and one brown bin for grass clippings.
- Cleaning costs have increased over the past 12 months to £16 per hour. We have also added to our costs a paid caretaker to cover all wedding weekends. In total, these costs have increased from £3,243 to £4,526.00 in this financial year.
- Expenditure on village events has totalled £3,371.04 this financial year, up from £1,411.84 in the previous year. This has included funding celebrations for the Queen's jubilee and the seniors lunch. For the children we also funded pantomime tickets, chocolate coins at Christmas, Easter eggs at Easter, and Halloween and Christmas parties. We received contributions from the parish council of £500 to support the Jubilee celebrations and £300 in advance of May's Coronation party.

#### **Summary**

Overall, the final figures for the annual accounts are similar to last year, which is a positive outcome given the significant rise in costs for utilities and supplies. Weddings have continued to provide the largest proportion of our income. However it should be noted that while wedding bookings are strong for this summer, we have just one booked for 2024 but might expect 6 or so by now. We have always expressed



concern about the popularity of the hall in recent years being a direct effect of post-COVID interest in weddings, but price rises will also have impacted. We remain vigilant to ensure that a balance remains that ensures future viability of the hall's finances.

We continue to seek to resolve the situation with the Bookings Clerk. Employing someone to take on this role would cost ~£5,000 with all the additional complications of being an employer.

### Looking ahead

The rise in expenditure between 2022 and 2023 can be explained by increased maintenance and utilities costs, plus additional costs supporting village events. Wedding bookings appear to be slowing, which could be a problem for future viability of the hall. It will be important to monitor this trend and try to establish whether this is due to the increase in hire fees or was simply a post-COVID increase in the number of couples looking for wedding venues.

Maintenance plans continue for the hall, including new curtains coming soon. A radiator leak over winter

Plans for the play area are on hold subject to the outcome of the insurance claim.

## **Parish Council news**

Hawstead Parish Council has a new Chair...

Just six residents stood for the Hawstead Parish Council election on 5 May 2023 and were therefore returned unopposed. Your new parish councillors are therefore (in



alphabetical order): Ros Alexander; Phil Baker; Penny Barham; Henry Brewis; Christabel Carr; and John West.

Phil, who has served as Chair for the last year, had announced that he wanted to relinquish that role, and at the Parish Meeting on 11 May, Ros was proposed and elected as his replacement.

But we have a vacancy! We are still legally able to operate as a council with six rather than the allotted seven people (as you can see by looking at the documents now posted on the website and on both our village noticeboards), but we are very keen that this role should be filled. We can do this by formally coopting someone, ideally at the next meeting on Thursday 13 July.

If you would like to put your knowledge, skills and interests to the service of the village, I would love to hear from you. Alternatively, if you know someone who you think would do a good job, let me know and perhaps together we can persuade them to put their name forward. The only stipulation is that they live or work in the parish.

Our job as a Parish Council is to:

- ensure that village amenities are well cared for
- be aware of national and regional decisions that may affect the village, and
- represent village interests in matters like planning.

We have a schedule of meetings every 2 months, with the occasional additional meeting for urgent planning matters, and we are exceptionally well supported by our very experienced parish clerk, Catherine Hibbert.

# **Report: Coronation celebrations**

Our Coronation celebrations took place on Monday 8 May at Hawstead Village Hall and were offered free to all villagers who wished to attend. The weekend was forecast to be wet and cool, but on Monday we managed to beat the weather and enjoyed a relatively dry, if cloudy, afternoon together welcoming King Charles III as our monarch.

## Swifts in Hawstead

The swift (on the left) is a medium-sized aerial bird and is a superb flyer. Sleeping, eating, bathing and even mating on the wing, swifts rarely touch the ground. They are also the fastest birds in level flight, with an impressive top speed of 69mph... and they are here in Hawstead!





Swifts pair for life, returning to the same site each year for some nest renovation before laying and incubating their eggs. They like to live in houses and churches, squeezing through tiny gaps to nest inside roofs. But as more old buildings are renovated and gaps in soffits closed up, swift nest sites are fast disappearing. This, in part, has resulted in swifts being added to the Red List in the 2021 UK Conservation Status Report.



### Swallow or swift?

The swallow (right image) and the swift (on the left) have a lot in common. They're both aerial experts that eat and drink on the wing. They're both summer visitors to the UK, making long migrations from Africa each spring. Yet despite these similarities, these two species aren't even closely related!

### How to tell the difference

Swallows (also known as barn swallows) are one of our most familiar and beloved birds, heralding the arrival of summer as they return from Africa each year. They have long, pointed wings and a deeply forked tail with long tail streamers.

While young swallows don't have tail streamers, their tail is still deeply forked. They're glossy blue on their back, with a white breast and belly. They have a dark band across the upper breast, like a collar, and a rusty red throat and face, though these just look dark at a distance.

Swifts are a similar length but have much longer wings. Their wings are also more pointed than a swallow's and sweep smoothly backwards like a sickle. They look a bit like boomerangs, with a body stuck to the middle!

Their short tail is often held together in a point, but is slightly forked when it's fanned out. The fork is much shallower than that of a swallow's tail, and it lacks the long, thin tail streamers.

Swifts are very dark birds, with sootyblack feathers all over — apart from a small, subtly paler patch on the throat. This patch is more obvious in juvenile swifts, where it also extends onto the face.

In an email from the RSPB entitled 'Notes on Nature', sent out at the end of April 2023, there was the following notice (see right):

As some of you may remember, we're doing our bit here in Hawstead by putting up some swift nesting boxes in the church tower. These are accompanied by a recording of swift calls, hoping to attract the birds as they return from Africa during the spring when they look for places to nest, hatch eggs and rear their young. These boxes – there are five of them – were made and erected by Bruce



## Thank you for taking action for Swifts

A huge thank you to all who have signed Hannah Bourne-Taylor's petition to make Swift bricks compulsory in new housing. We're delighted that this has reached over 100,000 signatures meaning that the UK Parliament will consider it for a debate. Swifts have suffered huge declines in the UK so desperately need our help. If you haven't already, there's still time to add your voice.

Sign by 30 April

Monk 2 years ago and, in terms of occupancy, we're hoping for a case of 'third time lucky'! Although the sound system, installed by Bob Brough, works fine, and we saw quite a number of the birds circling around the tower last year, they are yet to take the plunge and settle into our 'swift hotel'.



As you can see, the boxes have been inserted between the open louvres in one of the four openings on the level in the tower where the bells are located. (The rest of the louvred openings are covered over with chicken wire to keep out pigeons which would otherwise most happily make the tower their home.) This follows a standard layout for siting swift boxes in church towers, and apparently it is not unusual for it to take several years to attract them into the new homes which are

made ready for their occupancy.

Bob and I went to the church on Saturday 29 April, tidied things up a bit and restarted the recording of swift calls. It's set to broadcast in the early morning and early to mid-evening for the next 2–3 months. Of course, we hope that this year there may be some takers.

# What's a yoga class all about?

These days you can rarely read a magazine without some mention of practising yoga and its benefits. However, if you've never been to a class or looked it up on YouTube, you might wonder what on Earth it involves and what it will do for you. Here, one of our regular yoga instructors, Siobhan Kemp, explains all.

For all yoga classes a mat is placed on the floor, blankets or towels are arranged and maybe a cushion is used for comfort. We then have a darn good lie-down... to begin with, anyway.

Next we start to limber up and get the spine, hips, arms and legs moving. These movements activate the muscles and joints and the internal organs are gently stimulated. Yoga has the potential to slowly ease away stiffness, stagnation and feelings of being stuck; both physically and mentally.

Then we spend some time focusing on breath awareness and neck tension releases (some exercises you might find easier). We then move on to some more testing exercises... some movements you may find

harder (e.g. the occasional lunge, hip opener or armwork). But all the moves can be modified to suit the individual.

Whatever benefit you receive from practising yoga is personal to you. A session might energise you if you're sluggish or feeling flat; it might calm you if you're feeling a little frantic or het up. But you won't really know what yoga will do for you until you try it.

# Report: Hawstead's Spring Plant Fair

Our Spring Plant Fair 2023 offered seedlings and plants at bargain prices, as well as delicious tea and homemade cake. All plants were grown and nurtured by villagers, with more than £600 raised for village hall funds.

Hawstead's annual Coffee, Cake and Plant Sale took place on Saturday 13 May 2023 on a cold and bitter morning. Fran and Andy Evershed braved the low temperatures to man the plant stall all morning, while the rest of us huddled with tea and cake in the village hall for shelter! We also had to keep the overflow car park closed due to the unseasonably wet weather the previous 2 weeks. This resulted in a quieter event than usual.

Plants on offer included young tomato plants, cucumber and runner beans, sturdy sunflowers of various variety, curry plants, bearded irises, a multitude of cacti, crocosmia, goldenrod, daisies, cosmos and much more.


