HAWSTEAD COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

- An investment for Christmas -This January we took advantage of the Christmas/New Year sales to purchase a quality artificial tree for the village hall plus additional lights and decorations. Our real tree cost us nearly £100 annually, and each year the price is increasing. Plus, the needle drop is an additional cleaning issue. So, we hope that the new artificial tree will be a worthy replacement and supply us with many years of needle drop-free enjoyment!
- Advent at Hawstead Village Hall Once again the early December Advent Service and Christmas Lights Switch On at the village hall was well supported by villagers. About 40 residents attended to reflect on the true meaning of Christmas, and to recognise the start of preparations for Christmas. Afterwards participants enjoyed a selection of festive food and mulled wine, provided by Hawstead Community Council and the All Saints Church Team. Our thanks to Lesley for organising the event, to Fran, Rosemary, Ray and Ros for the musical accompaniment, and to Caroline Miller for lending us her Christmas tree for the evening! 'We had the pleasure of attending our first Advent at the Village Hall in early December, what a wonderful way to meet many of you. We sang carols, enjoyed some wine and nibbles, and listened to beautiful live music; this is an event which is already pencilled in our calendar for 2024! Maz & Joe (Old Forge Cottage)'
- **Spring Plant Fair** Have you started planting your seeds yet for this year? The annual Plant Fair will be taking place on Saturday 25th May; it's a great way to help the environment and share your spare seedling, as well as meet your fellow village growers.
- New Monthly Relax and Reset Session a new addition to our Health and Wellbeing for the village, the first session took place on 21st February which was very popular! Focusing on bringing peace and meditation to your life, the 90-minute sessions include mindfulness, guided meditation, and a soothing sound bath. You'll need to bring a yoga mat, pillow/cushions and a blanket to help foster your inner zen. Chairs are available for those who prefer to sit, or bring your own. These events are proving very popular. - New! Community Council Member We are delighted to welcome Joe Sheehan (Old Forge Cottage) as a co-opted member of Hawstead Community Council. New to the village with his wife Maz, now editor of Village Voice, both are keen to get involved and meet villagers. Joe brings a wealth of experience from business relationship management and event planning, so we are looking forward to working with Joe and seeing what new ideas he has for the village. There are now no spare places on the Community Council, and that reflects the active, and well supported nature of the work of the Committee.
- New! Community Village Voice New resident Marianne Sheehan has kindly volunteered to take on the task of
 gathering articles from villagers and bringing them all together to make a quarterly issue. While there is a regular core of

- New! Village Hall Floor In December we had to postpone the Christmas Drinks Party to allow the hall to close for a few weeks (with minimal disruption) for replacement of the hall and corridor floors. We had a significant radiator leak last winter which resulted in part of the floor getting very wet under the vinyl planks and also a marked depression forming across one end of the main hall. As a result, we had to take up the old floor, dry the room and have a full replacement of all the wood-effect floor... all under our insurance policy. We also took the opportunity to upgrade the carpet in the entrance to trap more wet and dirt on entry, and to have our plumber attend to replace and recheck all the radiator connections. It took a long time to decide on the replacement floor vinyl, and we think we must have done a very good job because we have had no complaints!

- New! Post-Event Cleaning Opportunity We are seeking a post-event cleaner to focus primarily on the washing up, cleaning the kitchen and tidying away (possibly wiping tables, stacking tables and chairs (if physically able etc.) after hire events at the Village Hall. We already have someone who is hoovering, washing floors and cleaning toilets. Ideally we would like to gather together a small group of villagers who will be shown the dates of upcoming events and select which they would like to cover. The post-event timings will likely be Saturday evening or Sunday afternoon/evening, although we have the occasional mid-week event. The role is paid, and ideally more than two people would be 'on duty' for each post-event kitchen clean. Cleans (not including the weekly cleaning tasks completed by our current cleaner) can be anything from 1-4 hours of washing up, depending on how large the event and how much cutlery, crockery and glassware is used. We will have an idea of the likely volume of washing up ahead of time. - Oil Theft in Hawstead The village hall's oil tank was raided at 6.45pm on Monday 22 January and half the oil taken. It took the two thieves around 15 minutes to arrive (from the direction of Bury St Edmunds at 18.43), reverse and park, hand pump out the oil and leave (in the direction of Lawshall at 18.57). This was 3 days after the tank was filled and will have cost the village ~£360 in oil alone. This was also at a time when plenty of vehicles were driving past the hall, although the thieves had turned off their headlights.
 - Please be vigilant with your own tanks and be aware that thieves are around.
 - Please can we ask anyone who regularly walks their dogs around the village green to walk past the oil tank and check the locks are still in place? We can then act sooner to check video footage/warn others.
 - If you are driving past and <u>see</u> a vehicle parked close to the oil tank (especially in the dark), please report it immediately to any member of the Community Council. No vehicle should ever be parked there unless there is an event on at the hall.



- Hawstead Community Council's AGM will be held on Monday 13 May, at which annual reports will be presented and a new Committee elected. We are keen to see some new faces involved, bringing along new ideas and a willingness to take on some responsibility. Our AGM is when you as a resident have the opportunity to hear what's been happening at the hall and maybe even consider joining us to help shape the future of the village hall. Getting involved with your Community Council will:
 - improve life in your village for all residents and
 - help you make new friendships to enhance your enjoyment of life in Hawstead.

Please consider joining our small and friendly Committee. The more active members we have involved, the less pressure on the few who are currently committed and the more likely we are all to enjoy the meetings and plan and experience fantastic social events for everyone here in the village. Please step forward and be part of our Community Council team! We can have up to nine members.

What will happen at the AGM?

At the AGM we will be voting to elect our new Honorary Officers and Executive Committee for 2024/25. All positions are available for election as per our Constitution. Nominations are invited for the following positions which all have voting rights at General Meetings:

- **Chair** Shall chair meetings, represent the Council at functions/meetings to which the group has been invited, to act as the spokesperson for the Council when necessary.
- Vice Chair Shall support and stand in for the Chair when necessary.
- **Secretary** Shall prepare, in consultation with the Chair, the agenda for meetings, take and keep minutes of all meetings and collect and circulate any relevant information within the Executive Committee.
- Treasurer Shall supervise the financial affairs of the Council and keep proper accounts that show all monies received and paid out by the Executive Committee and shall provide a financial statement at each meeting and produce accounts, independently examined by a competent person, to the Annual General Meeting.

If you wish to have a vote on Hawstead Community Council issues throughout the year, you need to be elected as a member of the Executive Committee. 
Something a little bit lovely.... Easter Nests

Ingredients

- 225g dark chocolate (in bits)
- 2tbsp golden syrup
- 50g butter
- 75g cornflakes
- mini eggs to decorate

Method

- Melt chocolate, golden syrup and butter together in a bowl over a saucepan of gently simmering water, stir until melted & smooth
- Remove bowl from heat and gently stir in cornflakes.
- Spoon into paper cases, top with eggs and chill for around hour in the fridge

ENVIRONMENTAL & NATURE NEWS

Helping our rare and special river!

'You're probably aware that several tributaries of the River Lark meet in different parts of the village. And you've probably been cursing the recent recurrent flooding and resulting potholes. You may not be aware the Lark is a chalk stream, one of about only 280 in the UK, which has most of the world's supply of such rivers.

In their natural state chalk streams support a huge variety of plants and animals. They have been described as the UKs equivalent of the Great Barrier Reef. But sadly, almost all of the UK's chalk streams are suffering high levels of pollution from a variety of sources. The Government has now identified eight chalk streams, one in each region of the UK to be 'flagship' examples of restoration over their entire river catchment areas. The Lark is one of these eight, and this is what has led to the designation 'Lark Corridor' in West Suffolk Council's recently published draft local plan.

Our little stream is of national, even international importance!

A local charity, the River Lark Catchment Partnership (RLCP), with the support of some 20 other organisations, including Anglian Water, West Suffolk Council and the National Trust is now aiming to restore the entire river from its source in Lawshall, and its merger with the River Linnet in the Abbey Gardens, through to its outfall into the Great Ouse in Cambridgeshire.

Starting in mid-March, a group of village volunteers will be contributing to the RLCP's Citizen Science programme regularly monitoring water quality and flow as the river meanders across the parish. This will provide the baseline data against which to measure water quality further downstream. It will help plan how to restore the river, which in turn will encourage wildlife, mitigate the ever-increasing threats of flooding, and enable residents to enjoy a beautiful natural resource.

I am delighted to say we already have over a dozen people who are keen to take part!




