Hawstead Village Fete coming soon...

Our annual village fete is set for Sunday 10
September from 2 til 5pm on the village green.
Come along and meet your neighbours over a cuppa and cake, and have a go at some of the traditional fete games.

This year we've moved the date of the Hawstead fete one week later because many of our fete volunteers are away the first weekend in September. Scheduling the fete for 10 September

also means that children will be back at school and families will have returned from their holidays. So hopefully, that will make a busier day!



We are going to make the fete simple this year, so there is less pressure on volunteers and we can all have fun and have the chance to relax with friends in the afternoon. But there will still be plenty to enjoy!

We'll have traditional games including the coconut shy and splat the rat, the book stall (with new stock!), the BBQ and bar, a tea and cake stall and, if the village green is cut in time, a tractor display.

The produce competition is at the heart of the fete, but the organisation of so many categories is complicated. Having had fewer entries in recent years, we are going to try and simplify it in 2023. The number of categories has decreased, and there's just one cake competition.

Remember, the Produce Show is **FREE TO ENTER**, and we've made it so you can find something in your house or garden that you are proud of and can easily enter for the fete without too much stress!

Flowers

Class 1: best individual bloom

Class 2: best flower arrangement (miniature or full size)

Class 3: best vegetable (display the vegetable you are most proud of from your garden... it can be an individual vegetable or a plateful, for example, four beans)

Class 6: best artwork, painting, photograph or craft work, including knitting

Children's category

Class 7: best photograph, artwork or craft work Class 8: best miniature flower arrangement

Class 9: best character (animal or human) created from vegetables

Produce Show Cake Competition

This year the baker of the winning cake wins a £20 Waitrose voucher! Check out the recipe below and start practising!

This year we are having one cake competition for allcomers. The recipe, chosen by Sheilagh Mead, is a classic carrot cake.

Ingredients

2 cups flour

2tsp baking powder

1tsp bicarbonate

1tsp salt

2tsp cinnamon

2 cups brown sugar

4 eggs

3 cups carrots (grated)

1 cup walnuts

1 cup corn oil

This is a classic all-in-one recipe. Place all the ingredients into a bowl. You can mix it by hand or use an electric whisker. Put the mixture into a cake tin, either a round tin approximately 7.5 inches, or a loaf tin. Decorate as you like (some people don't like the soft icing, so we are leaving it up to you!).

The cakes will be judged on taste and appearance.

Cook for about 25/30 minutes on 180 electric Gas 4 or until the top and sides are golden, and a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out clean.

Hawstead's Community Orchard

Most villagers know that we have a community orchard in the Millennium Field next to the church car park. It was created by volunteers in the nick of time, just before lockdown struck in 2020, and comprises a collection of fruit trees – apples, pears, plums, gages and damsons. Here Andy Parrett updates us on progress.

From small saplings, these fruit trees are growing, albeit some needing to be encouraged into a better pattern of growth than they have adopted so far! But then these different species/varieties do have different habits in terms of how and where to push out new branches.





Having taken a trip down to the orchard today (29 July), I can see that some trees are now beginning to produce fruit! There again, others aren't! There are also signs of some disease and leaves being eaten by (I guess) birds. Ah well... at any rate, I can confirm that this is an organic orchard and I don't plan

to be using any chemicals to control pests and diseases.

One tree (a pear by the name of Beth) gave up the ghost very early on, But I'm pleased to say that a replacement will be coming next winter. Also a space which wasn't used in the initial purchase will be planted with another Suffolk apple variety called 'Lady

Henniker'. It was introduced by the head gardener at Thornham Hall near Eye in 1873 and named after the Lady of the Hall. It achieved an RHS First Class Certificate just 2 years later, so we should be able to look forward to some excellent apples from this tree in a few years time.

By the way, there's a few small fungi in the orchard as well.







Suffolk's wild orchids

In July 2023, on the left as you get towards the top of Bull Hill, Andy Parrett spotted a patch of magenta pyramidal orchids blooming. They can also be found occasionally in local fields and on the protected grassland of the village green.





The pyramidal orchid is a small orchid that lives up to its name. The orchid's head comprises a bright pinky-purple, densely packed pyramid of flowers atop a green stem with long, narrow and pointed leaves. Each densely packed flower spike holds up to 100 flowers, and attracts a range of butterflies and moths. It particularly likes chalk grassland, sand dunes, roadside verges and quarries.

It can grow up to 55cm tall and is relatively common, flowering in June and July each year. It is also quite widespread in England and Wales, but scarcer in Scotland.

Did you know?

Orchid seeds do not store enough food to grow on their own, so they team up with a mat-forming fungus in the soil. In turn, the orchid's roots protect the fungus.

New community clubs for Hawstead?

Lots of interest was expressed in our 2022 community survey for more clubs in Hawstead. We handed the initiative back to villagers to get things started. What's happened to date?

So far we have had just two villagers interested in a gardening WhatsApp group, and that's it! To join the **Hawstead WhatsApp Gardening Group**, you will need a mobile phone and WhatsApp on your phone. Please email bookings@hawsteadvillagehall.co.uk with your name and

In terms of other groups starting up, we remain eager to facilitate any new ideas for community access, but will not be organising them ourselves. So if you would like to get something started, please touch base with a member of your Community Council so we can help get things moving.

Suffolk Historic Churches Trust

The Suffolk Historic Churches Trust (SHCT) Annual Ride and Stride (https://shct.org.uk/ride-and-stride) will take place on Saturday 9 September between 9am and 5pm. Can you play a part in fundraising or welcoming tired visitors?

Every second Saturday in September for 40 years the SHCT has been running its famous bike ride fundraiser – invented here in Suffolk and now copied all over England! These days it is called Ride and Stride because some fundraisers choose to walk. You might consider cycling as a family, with friends or as a solo,



finding companions along the way. Some cyclists do 20 or 30 churches, but most settle for a relaxed ride between 4 or 5. You will receive a warm welcome at the churches, and you might be surprised by the fascinating social history in the churches that you visit.

All you need do ahead of the day is plan a route and get friends and family to sponsor you with either a



fixed sum or on a per church basis. Half of the money you raise will go straight to the Church you nominate (hopefully All Saints, Hawstead!) and half to the Trust to help churches in their moments of need when the roof leaks or the masonry crumbles.

We also ran another of our CLASSIC CAR EVENINGS in






Jammie Dodgers

Our village volunteer group the Jammie Dodgers has been busy since the previous issue of the Village Voice. Volunteers have been out in force with paint brushes in hand brightening up the bus shelter and the swings on the village green.

On Saturday 24 June a small group of village volunteers met up at the bus shelter at the bottom of Whepstead Road for a few hours renovating the paintwork. Villager Dave Dawson had already been down to replace some

broken roof tiles and plastic guttering. On the Saturday morning, all the internal walls were repainted



In time, we also plan to install a wooden bench inside to complete the upgrade.

The Parish Council also decided that the metal swings on the village green were in

need of some cosmetic attention. So on a fine Saturday morning in August another team of village volunteers did the necessary. Wielding paintbrushes this time were Penny, Jayne, Rebecca, James, Janet and Andy.

The swings were originally bought for the village in 1970. Indeed there's a small plaque on the swings that confirms this date by Wicksteed the manufacturers. Miss Stella Woodman-Smith, who did a great deal for Hawstead back then, arranged the purchase. Further research also reveals that the swings were erected on site 53 years ago by Mr Pat Baker of Shepherds Cottage and Mr John Smith late of Whepstead Road.

Church news

After months of waiting, we now have confirmation of the new benefice arrangements. We are to become part of 'The Benefice of Horringer', along with Nowton, Westley, Whepstead and Brockley.

Finally it has been agreed under a Pastoral Scheme by the Church Commissioners on 21 July 2023 to dissolve the Benefice of St Edmund Way, with the creation of a new Benefice of Nowton and Hawstead that will belong to the archdeaconry of Sudbury and the deanery of Thingoe. This Benefice will join with the old Horringer Benefice to create a new Benefice named 'The Benefice of Horringer'. It will comprise the parishes of Horringer cum



Ickworth, Brockley, Westley, Whepstead, Nowton and Hawstead. Canon Malcolm Eric Osborne holds an ecclesiastical in the old Horringer Benefice, and he will be the first incumbent of the new Horringer Benefice.

There will be a service of licensing at Lawshall Church on Monday 25 September (time to be confirmed).



Ragwort warning - be vigilant

Poisonous to grazing livestock, this quite attractive yellow weed is becoming more often seen in hedgerows and nomow gardens. If allowed to go to seed, the knock-on impact on grazing land can be massive. Here's the low-down on this native plant and information about controlling it.



Ragwort (Senecio jacobaea) is one of the most divisive plants

in the countryside. It is a native biennial and is a food source for a wide range of insects, particularly the cinnabar moth. Not usually a significant problem in gardens, its poisonous qualities can make it a serious issue in paddocks and gardens backing onto fields grazed by horses or cattle.



The pretty daisy-like clusters of yellow flattened flower heads of common ragwort belie the poisonous nature of this plant. It is a relatively tall-growing plant (up to around 90cm) with leaves that look 'feathery' because they are very divided. It flowers in its second year from June to November.

How common is ragwort?

Experts suggest that once ragwort is on certain areas of land, it can be really difficult to manage. A single plant can contain thousands of seeds, and these can disperse easily into fields.

Many farmers take preventative measures to reduce the risk of ragwort spreading on the land they own, but it is hard to reduce the risk fully because it often appears on areas that are less easy to control, such as roadside verges.

Is ragwort poisonous?

Ragwort contains toxins called pyrrolizidine alkaloids. These, in sufficient quantities, can cause liver poisoning in horses and other livestock. It is a cumulative poison that eventually leads to the rapid onset of symptoms before death.

Can you control ragwort?

It is vital that ragwort plants and roots are removed before they seed and spread the weed further.

Non-chemical options for preventing its spread are limited, including pulling ragwort using a special fork and gloves. Hawstead village green is checked regularly for ragwort because a crop of hay is usually taken from it each year.

These days, farmers typically apply the herbicide glyphosate. However, the use of glyphosate is controversial.

Ragwort is covered by both the Weeds Act 1959 and the Ragwort Control Act 2003, the latter of which provides a code of practice for preventing the spread of the plant.

Only the Brave...

On Sunday 24 September, East
